A beautiful new Sixth Form facility with state-of-theart learning and social spaces.

Our new Sixth Form Centre (opened in September 2022) includes a common room and café, dedicated lecture and teaching spaces, and study, collaboration and social spaces, all designed to bridge the gap between secondary education and university.

University style teaching spaces provide comfortable and productive places to learn, collaborate and debate.

Quiet Study Zone - In this area, the emphasis is on quiet or silent working, with a lower ceiling, acoustically treated wall panelling and library-style tables with power sockets for laptops and iPads.

Dedicated Teaching Spaces –

Teaching styles at A Level can differ significantly from GCSE study and require dedicated teaching spaces. Our new Sixth Form centre has a variety of different teaching spaces used exclusively for A Level studies, particularly those subjects only offered at A Level.

Collaborative Work Areas – This space, chosen for the high degree of natural light, is perfectly placed to provide an inspiring setting for project work and collaborative learning.

Acoustic Study Pods - An area


for group study, acknowledging that learning is not always an independent, or indeed a silent activity. This space provides the perfect setting for project work and collaborative learning.

UCAS & Careers - A dedicated UCAS and Careers Office, providing careers and university advice, resources and support. A warm and inviting series of social spaces, expanding the concept of a common room, with a new café, more seating, balconies to enjoy the summer sun and cosy acoustic pods to share a coffee with friends.

The Lounge - A versatile space that is both a unique teaching room and social area. With sofas and armchairs, it doesn't look like a traditional classroom but is an innovative environment for discursive lessons, debating and reading.

Acoustic Seating Pods - Seating zones with sound-reducing pods, equipped with flat screen monitors, that can be used by Sixth Formers for group collaboration and project work.

Sixth Form Café - A fabulous, new café at the heart of the common room, serving a range of hot drinks, sandwiches, fruit and snacks.

Pastoral Care

Daily pastoral support is always available for every Sixth Form student.

Pastoral care is the cornerstone of Tormead Sixth Form and the basis of all our students' successes.

The form tutor system, with vertical form groups means that every student has the opportunity to access support at the start of every day. During pastoral sessions, students receive targeted support to manage their individual challenges as well as to help them build skills to overcome any future potential barriers to their success.

The Sixth Form team – comprising of the Head of Sixth Form, Head of University Admissions, Head of Careers and the Sixth Form tutor team – are responsible for the welfare of the students and are available before, during and after school. We operate an open-door policy and the team have a great deal of experience in working with Sixth Formers. Every student benefits from regular one-to-one chats with the Sixth Form team to discuss any matters of concern.

Wellbeing Centre

Our Wellbeing team is made up of School Nurses, Counsellors and Pastoral Support Officers; together, they provide support in response to specific needs.

- Our Counsellors are available for a free and confidential counselling service; each student has access to a number of sessions each academic year.
- Our School Nurses are available every day to respond to acute and chronic medical problems.
- Our Pastoral Support Officers are available throughout the day as a listening ear for any student experiencing upset or difficulty.


Pastoral support includes raising awareness of our students' place in the world through our Horizons and Sixth Sense programmes where students have the benefit of hearing fortnightly talks by industry experts and speakers sharing their experiences and journeys.

Sixth Sense is a programme of talks and workshops to help prepare the students for life beyond Tormead. This is mainly delivered by Tormead staff but occasionally outside speakers are invited to contribute. This initiative encourages discussions relating to mental health and topics such as sexuality and identity. It is a popular forum for inspiring debate beyond the classroom.

Horizons is a fortnightly lecture series delivered by a wide range of outside speakers. The line-up changes each year but in recent sessions we have had a speaker who discussed how he overcame a serious drug addiction, another told of his experiences since being paralysed from the chest down and another outlined her life after severe facial burns. These talks allow the students to observe resilience and perseverance with the opportunity to ask questions and enhance their empathy and listening skills.









Academic Life

During their two key years of academic progress and fulfilment, our Sixth Form students achieve so much.

Not only do their impressive A Level grades and exciting university destinations speak for themselves, but the wide scope of degree subjects chosen also reflects our diverse curriculum.

That is why we believe that the knowledge and learning they gain here at Tormead will always stay with them.

Leaders in their field – and classroom!

At Tormead, Learning Mentors embrace the opportunity to develop skills in communication, leadership and adaptability as they work with Heads of Department to spread enthusiasm in their favourite subjects. This community-based approach enables our Sixth Form students to be true role models and builds their confidence as leaders in their academic fields of choice.

Academic Enrichment

Our Academic Enrichment programme continues to grow in the Sixth Form where we expect the students to lead by example and take control of their own learning.

The Sixth Form Centre buzzes with curiosity, intrigue and passion about the latest issues of the day – and we want to encourage our students to stand up and be counted.

Our enrichment programme offers students the opportunity to attend a 30-minute university style lecture every week. This initiative aims to foster a love of learning outside of the traditional classroom environment. The lectures are enormously popular and we usually have between 50-100 students attend each week.

The lectures are led by staff and Sixth Form students and the topics covered are designed to challenge and inspire students. The programme encourages our Sixth Form students to take a leadership role in the school community and learn the valuable life skill of presenting complex ideas to a large audience.

Lecture topics have included:

- Women in STEM
- The holocaust a personal story
- Crime and punishment in late medieval England
- The British Empire: heroes or villains?
- Untranslatable words
- Women's voices in poetry in the ancient world
- How to 'read' film with a critical eye
- What is the unconscious, and how can it explain the bully?
- · The history of gunpowder

The Sixth Form students have explored a wide range of interesting and engaging topics such as:

- Why do we dream?
- What are the moral responsibilities for those who choose to protest?
- Who really won the space race in the 1960s?
- Will Artificial Intelligence take over the world?
- The use of digital technology in sport

At the heart of this programme is choice. Students choose to attend those lectures which most appeal to them. For those who do not want to attend a lecture, we run a series of enrichment sessions designed to encourage debate and extend the students' knowledge of current affairs and contentious modern issues such as Al and censorship.

Beacon Enrichment Portfolio

We also offer the opportunity for every student to develop their own enrichment portfolio across the academic year in an area (or areas) of their choice. This portfolio provides a platform for students to showcase their super-curricular activities and achievements and allows them to demonstrate their ability to think critically and creatively. There is an expectation that the academic scholars engage with this wholeheartedly.

Scholars

Academic scholarship holders are expected to take part in a wealth of super-curricular activities. They are given opportunities to attend the Gresham Society lectures and IMAG (Guildford 11-19 Partnership) events and to join the Oxplore Book Club.

The Clayton Society for scholars encourages critical debate of big philosophical or societal issues and this takes place every Tuesday lunchtime. Scholars are also invited to our annual Scholars' Dinner with a guest speaker.

All Sixth Form scholars are expected to give a full 20-minute enrichment lecture to the rest of the School. Year 12 and 13 scholars receive bespoke training in presentation skills and how to create and present a longer form piece of academic research. This is mandatory for scholars but all Sixth Form students are welcome to take part.

Subject mentors and scholars run a subject specific mentoring session for the lower school in their strongest subject. This 'twilight' session is entirely student led and encourages our Sixth Form students to engage with the lower school, offering expert help and advice.

All students in the Sixth Form are expected to develop and update an academic reading or listening portfolio in the subject(s) they are interested in studying at university, encouraging them to be more independent and preparing them for the academic reading required of them at university.

Co-curricular

Our co-curricular provision is exciting and varied, giving each student the opportunity to experience new activities and find their niche.

Activities are offered before school, at lunchtime and after school, with additional trips running at the weekends and during the holidays. From chess, knitting and climbing to performing in a musical, the students are encouraged to be actively involved in the running of a club (in collaboration with a member of staff). This allows them to develop their leadership skills for the benefit of the wider school community.

Clubs and societies are an integral part of Tormead's Sixth Form and can play an important role in a student's personal and cultural development. There are over 100 clubs and societies that meet during lunchtime or after school. Sixth Formers are actively encouraged to take a leadership role in many of the activities offered.

Trips

Sixth Form students have the opportunity to explore different locations, to learn outside the classroom and to enhance their understanding of subjects and places.

Trips to museums, galleries and the theatre are offered throughout the year. Biologists and geographers will participate in residential fieldtrips within the UK. Those studying Geography will have the opportunity to discover the wonders of Iceland. Students of Government and Politics have the opportunity to visit Washington.

Sixth Form students are encouraged to take on the challenge of the Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award, which involves expeditions to the Welsh Black Mountains and Dartmoor. There is also a comprehensive Sports Tour Programme. Past tours have included Malaysia and South Africa.

Tormead has established links with the town of Besishahar in Nepal and the Mai Chau region of Vietnam. These links are nurtured with Sixth Form expeditions to both locations. Past expeditions have also included Ecuador and the Galapagos, Zambia and Botswana.

Sport

Sport, fitness and physical education are so important for all our students, whatever their ability. That is why we always aim for a balance between encouraging inclusivity and developing elite performers.

As well as nurturing the roots of a healthy lifestyle, all types of movement support mental and emotional good health. The transferable life skills involved in being part of a team and showing mutual respect for opponents are also invaluable.

Our diversity of options reflects what the students enjoy – from team sports to individual activities such as cross-country (and we have recently added rowing to our wide range of choices). Our two-week timetable enables the students to stay involved across different sports and compete for several teams. In fact, any student who wants to be in a school team can do so.



Facilities

Our sports facilities on site include netball and tennis courts as well as a purpose-built sports hall with fitness suite and full-sized gymnastics sprung floor area. Our new Urnfield home ground, located just one mile away, includes a full-sized hockey Astro pitch, athletics track and football, rugby and cricket pitches. We are also fortunate to have access to some of the best facilities in Surrey at the Surrey Sports Park, the Spectrum and Blue Spider Climbing Centre.



Elite Athlete Programme

For students aiming to train and compete at an elite level, we offer exceptional training opportunities and support their aspirations with our Elite Athlete Programme which tailors a strength and conditioning programme to their individual needs (plus advice on nutrition, rest and recovery, and sports psychology). Our elite athletes represent Tormead at county, regional and national levels.







Performing Arts

The performing arts help develop each student intellectually, socially and pastorally.

The performing arts engage with the entire school curriculum. Drama, music and dance's public aspects - performing and sharing work with others provide important links between the students, parents and the wider community. Above all, the performing arts at Tormead strive to be enjoyable, accessible and actively involve students in different ways and at all levels. The performing arts have a vital part to play within Tormead's academic curriculum, providing a unique outlet for self-expression, creativity, teamwork and fun.

Music

Music is central to school life at Tormead. Students make music at over 60 events each academic year, with additional opportunities for informal performances.

Tormead has a 25-strong team of music teachers and instrumental specialists. Nearly 50% of students learn an instrument in school and a range of co-curricular ensembles enhances the music curriculum.

Co-curricular

Co-curricular music thrives at Tormead with larger bands and orchestras and smaller ensembles accommodating musicians of all abilities. Over 20 ensembles rehearse every week with large-scale performances featuring students in their hundreds to music festivals and more intimate soloist evenings.

Wider Opportunities

Music has taken Tormead students all over the UK and beyond. We hold a biennial music tour to Europe, with previous tours to Germany, Italy and France. Closer to home, students have recently performed concerts, recitals and choral services at a number of venues including Winchester, Southwark and Portsmouth Cathedrals, G-Live and the Yvonne Arnaud Theatre.

Music scholars and exhibition holders follow a programme of enrichment and extension including workshops, masterclasses and concert visits. Tormead also runs an endangered instruments scheme, offering 10 fully-funded places to learn an endangered instrument each academic year. This year places have been offered on bassoon, double bass, French horn, oboe, orchestral percussion, trombone and viola.

Our ethos at Tormead is to enable our students to feel comfortable and confident when performing to an audience, whatever their performance level.









Drama

The aims of Tormead Drama are threefold: enjoyment, innovation and self-expression. It has a unique place in the school curriculum. We aim to give every Drama student skills that are transferable and useful in the wider world, such as co-operation, self-control and, most importantly, self-confidence, through a wide and varied curricular and co-curricular programme.

We promote a job in the Performing Arts as a possibility to be considered and therefore encourage professionals in to teach workshops whenever possible. We make our students aware of external events and opportunities, as well as offering a varied plethora of internal activities for them to be involved in, both on stage and behind-the-scenes.

Stretching our most talented students

Sixth Form students take the lead directorial and design roles in the ever-popular House Drama Competition as well as having the opportunity to be a part of the Upper School Theatre Company where students have the chance to produce a piece of theatre in whichever style or format they wish. As a department, we try and use professional venues where possible to enhance the learning experience for our performers. Our recent production of 'Legally Blonde' was on the main stage at the Yvonne Arnaud Theatre.

Nationwide initiatives, such as the National Theatre Connections Project, the Shakespeare Schools Festival or the Leatherhead Drama Festival, give students additional chances to perform on professional stages. Students are also guided through auditions for outside companies such as the National Youth Theatre, G Live Creative Company, Monologue Slam UK and for television work with casting agencies.

Outreach and Volunteering

Charitable work is at the heart of Tormead life. Volunteering is not an added extra, but is what we do. Every year students spend over 4,500 hours volunteering in the local community.

Work includes nurturing primary school children, peer-to-peer mentoring, visiting local retirement homes, working in local charity shops, litter picking in the surrounding roads, working with the St Joseph's Trust, help tending to the Rosamund Community Garden and conservation in the Surrey Hills.

Voluntary work benefits the local community and fosters the value of service in the students, encouraging responsibility for each other and the environment.













Beyond Sixth Form

Our Careers Education Programme complements an exciting curriculum which promotes academic excellence, intellectual curiosity, and creative learning, as well as a variety of co-curricular activities. It encourages students to build essential career management skills, namely the ability to recognise their strengths, interests, and values, understand their non-negotiables, build their network, make evidence-led decisions and explore the world of work, training and learning. **Cultivating these essential** skills in our students ensures they are future ready and can navigate an ever-changing landscape of higher education and employment with resilience and flexibility, thereby shaping a life of purpose and authenticity beyond Tormead.

We provide impartial advice, coaching and support to all students and parents, to facilitate informed decision making at every stage. Focusing on the right path for each individual student is at the heart of the provision provided by our qualified and experienced Careers Advisor. We promote curiosity, reflection, aspirational thinking, and decisive action. All routes post-Tormead are considered valid and achievable.

Work Experience

All Year 12 students are expected to undertake work experience. This is a brilliant opportunity to explore potential career interests and gain much needed experience for UCAS or Degree Apprenticeship applications. We work closely with our wonderful parent and alumnae community to identify unique and valuable opportunities. Extensive support is provided for sourcing placements, writing CVs and attending interviews.

Encounters with Employers

Professionals from our engaged and generous parent and alumnae community share their career experiences and must-have tips for success through a variety of formats. This sparks imagination about the range of possibilities for the future, breaks down stereotypes and contextualises learning by linking it

to the world of work. The popular annual Networking Event, organised by our Alumnae & Development office, provides an opportunity for students to learn about different career paths and professions. Students are empowered to approach professionals in a safe, familiar environment, providing a taster of what it means to network and increasing their independence and confidence.

We also have links with the National Theatre and other performing arts professionals who visit Tormead to impart advice and run workshops on how to successfully record self-tape auditions. In 2021 four Tormead students were successful at their National Theatre auditions.

Encounters with Higher Education

Our links with the University of Surrey include a visit to The Court of the Future in the Law School to watch mock trials and debate human rights. The University of Surrey admissions team deliver presentations to our Sixth Form about choosing a degree, student finance and student life. Students from the Veterinary School also visit Tormead to impart their experience, knowledge, and expertise to budding Veterinary Science students. Each department organises subject specific talks through our Enrichment Programme.





In partnership with Tormead's fantastic Alumnae & Development Office, we offer an exciting programme of networking evenings and sector specific workshops to inspire, inform and encourage our students to achieve their goals. Virtually all our Upper Sixth students achieve their firstchoice university places - with approximately 10% applying to Oxbridge places. After all, our alumnae show the limitless possibilities waiting for our students. We have old Tormedians currently working at McLaren, Dyson, Mercedes, helping to design the London Underground, one who is firmly committed to joining a future Martian expedition... not to mention CEOs, set designers, lawyers, costume designers, doctors, researchers, authors, journalists and the Premier League's first female football commentator!

Oxbridge Application Support Programme

Students applying to Oxbridge receive a dedicated support programme from our Oxbridge Application Coordinators and tutors. We provide intensive personal statement feedback, and a mock interview programme with the support of relevant sector professionals and experienced Oxbridge alumnae.

Leading Talent Beyond Tormead

A Tormead education means that our students will enjoy a relationship for life with the School. Alumnae are brought together by ConnecTormead, our alumnae network. Our Development and Alumnae Office supports old Tormeadians to remain in contact with the School and each other, and they can access a world of similarly minded people for support, community and friendship.

As part of the assessment process, we contact the applicant's current school to request a brief confidential report about the applicant's academic and other achievements. Registered candidates will be sent further information about the Art, Drama, and Music Scholarships available along with the application process.

All candidates are invited to a series of interviews with Mr Boyd, the Head of Sixth Form and Head of Careers.

Should a candidate wish to apply for a scholarship they complete an application form and attend an audition/assessment for art, drama and music. For the Academic Scholarship they nominate two subjects they would like to sit scholarship papers for.
